In May, SAGE hosted its inaugural public event with guest speaker and **Visiting SAGE**, Marc Freedman. With over 150 guests filling the house at the Oregon Historical Society, we enjoyed Marc's inspiring presentation on how seniors can live a legacy of public service. At the event, over forty percent of our guests expressed interest in engaging more with SAGE. SAGE is actively planning another Visiting SAGE event for 2014.

Speakers shared heartfelt and powerful stories about how the Roys trained, inspired, and supported hundreds of people to turn ideas for social good into real world projects. Inspiring leadership

This spring, SAGE will offer its Legacy Fellowship to inspire people over fifty to launch social benefit projects of their own design. The Fellowship will involve groups of twelve to fifteen people who each agree to dedicate fifteen volunteer hours per month for ten months to develop and implement a project that addresses challenges facing younger and future generations. Working with a coach and mentored by peers, each fellow will be trained to develop a project that meets a need, is doable in ten months, and will capitalize on a fellow's personal passions and strengths.

Raising awareness, person to person

SAGE Socials are small group conversations in homes with eight or more guests to spark conversations about the role of older Americans in safeguarding opportunities for younger and future generations. Guests reflect on their own opportunities in life, share concerns for the future, and explore how older Americans can help coming generations.

This year, we led four Socials, and three luncheons with students and leaders in government and business. Taken together, we sparked conversations with over one hundred people about giving forward in the communities, and these discussions significantly influenced our goals and programs for 2014.

Connecting people to leaders

Our **StoryTree** highlights the volunteer efforts of our Sages, exemplary volunteers who champion local causes and who are available to mentor peers interested in giving forward in their community. This year, we featured Jeanne Magmer for giving forward for local schools and students, and Walt Mintkeski for his efforts to restore water quality.
